

# At Home Passover Photo Scavenger Hunt

This photo scavenger hunt is to be completed at home, with permission from an adult. Once you have all 10 pictures, have an adult email them to Jamie at [JMafdali@templedordorim.org](mailto:JMafdali@templedordorim.org).

1. Passover falls every year in Spring, go outside and take a picture of "new life."
2. On the Seder plate, we include something bitter (the maror) to remind us our time as slaves. Find something bitter (or sour) and take a picture. If you're brave, take a picture of you trying it!
3. Charoset is a sweet mixture of apples, nuts, and wine. It symbolizes the mortar (cement) the Jewish slaves in Egypt used to build structures. Build a structure out of playdough, blocks, Legos, or anything else you have on hand and take a picture.
4. During Passover, Jewish people do not eat bread. We eat matzah instead. Take a picture of yourself being as flat as you can be, like matzah!
5. The afikoman is a piece of matzah that is broken and hidden in the early stage of the Passover seder. The word "afikoman" means dessert in ancient Greek. What is the best hiding place for the hidden matzah (afikomen)? Take a picture of your favorite stuffed animal (or another item) hiding there.
6. During Passover we are supposed to recline as royalty. Take a picture of yourself reclining.
7. We traditionally drink four cups of wine or grape juice during the Seder. We also recite the four questions and hear about the four children. Take a picture of yourself holding four of the same item. (ex: 4 bananas or 4 decks of cards).
8. During the Seder, we dip parsley (karpas) in saltwater to symbolize the tears the Jews cried while slaves in Egypt. Take a picture with the saddest face you can make.
9. It is a custom for Jewish people to say "Next Year in Jerusalem" at the end of their Seder because they would like to celebrate next year in Israel. Take a picture of you pointing to Israel on a map.
10. Passover is the holiday where we retell the story of our people leaving Egypt and our freedom. Can you find an item we use at Passover in your home?
